

Duke University Gets \$37.2M Gates Foundation AIDS Grant

The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation has awarded three grants totaling \$37.2 million to Duke University, according to a Duke University statement. The largest grant, for \$24.6 million, goes to fund the efforts of the Comprehensive Antibody Vaccine Immune Monitoring Consortium (CAVIMC) to find a viable HIV vaccine. Another grant, for \$11.7 million, goes toward studying the proteins in HIV's outer envelope, so as to learn to copy those proteins to stimulate antibodies to attack the virus during transmission. The third grant dedicates \$892,000 to study complement proteins—used by the immune system to target viruses for white blood cells to attack, and which attach poorly to HIV—to strengthen immune response against the virus.
